753,508 CASES OF EGGS RECEIVED HERE DURING 1936

Receipts at Los Angeles Market Second Largest in Five Years

Northern and central California poultry ranches supplied many cases of eggs for the Los Angeles market during 1936, according to the annual report of the Federal State Market News Service report issued this month.

Total receipts at the Los Angeles market were 753,508 cases. The report shows that 97,939 cases came from outside states, totaling approximately 28 cars, according to Bert R. Holloway, pioneer hatcheryman, who each month makes a careful study of the import and export shipments of eggs from this district.

Peter DePaolo Tells Thrills of Epical Indianapolis Victory

The Van Nuys Rotary club was entertained by an outstanding figure in automobile racing circles Wednesday when Peter DePaolo recounted his racing experiences leading up to and including winning of the A. A. A. championship in 1935 and 1937. The speaker was introduced by Attorney Victor O'Connell, chairman of the club's program.

DePaolo, winner of the 1935 Indianapolis 500-mile classic, when he had a second average for the entire 500 miles, a record which stood for three years and that his greatest thrill in racing came to him as he secured the finishing line on the Indianapolis speedway each lap and realized that \$100 was the field for each lap that he led the field. He went on to win a total of \$50,000.

In winning the 1935 championship he amassed a total of 2286 points, the highest number acquired by any champion. It is said only a national champion but an international star as well, having competed in many outstanding European stamens. He is a nephew of Ralph DePalma, one of the world's greatest racing champions.

DePaolo has for some time represented Thompson Products, Inc. of Cleveland, Ohio, manufacturer of automobile and airplane parts.

OREGON SHIPPED MOST POULTRY TO LOCAL MARKET

California Supplies Only 24 Per Cent of Los Angeles Receipts

California ranches supplied but 24 per cent of the dressed poultry consumed in the Los Angeles district, while outside states shipped in 74 per cent, according to the annual report issued this month by the Federal State Market News Service.

Oregon was the largest importer, with 2,253,031 pounds, exceeding by almost 200,000 pounds the total amount shipped to Los Angeles from Oregon during the year, as reported by shipping 1,387,883 pounds to the local market. Oregon and Utah shipments consisted largely of turkeys.

The following table shows the number of pounds of poultry shipped by fifteen states to the Los Angeles market during the year, also the number of pounds sent to the local market by California ranches.
